The game rooms have been in the making since the beginning of the 1983-84 school year and have now become a reality. The game rooms provide several forms of entertainment. PROPOSED CHANGE IN GRAD REQUIREMENTS

(note: the curriculum was prepared with these goals in mind)

1. CLARIFY AND DEVELOP PERSONAL VALUES.
2. DEVELOP AN AWARENESS OF AND A RESPECT FOR THE HISTORY, CONTRIBUTIONS, AND INTERDEPENDENCE OF WORLD CULTURES.
3. EXPLORE THE QUESTIONS OF EXISTENCE AND ULTIMATE MEANING.
4. GAIN INSIGHT INTO THE FACTORS THAT DETERMINE INDIVIDUAL AND SOCIAL BEHAVIOR.
5. IDENTIFY AND DEAL WITH CONTEMPORARY PROBLEMS AND ISSUES.
6. IMPROVE THE SKILLS OF REASONING, CRITICAL THINKING, AND COMMUNICATION.
7. INVESTIGATE THE RELATIONSHIPS THAT GOVERN NATURE AND THE PHYSICAL WORLD.
8. UNDERSTAND AND EXPLORE THE CULTURAL HERITAGE OF WESTERN CIVILIZATION.

PROPOSED REVISION TO REQUIREMENTS

A. MAJOR- Area of primary concentration; same as currently described. Hours: 30-40.

B. COURSE REQUIREMENTS- Required of every student regardless of major. Hours: 24.

TH 105 Intro. to Theology - 3 hrs.
 PL 101 Intro. to Philo. - 3 hrs.
 HU 130-131 Lit., Music, Art
 in the Western World 6 hrs.
 GL 101-102 Global Studies - 6 hrs.
 EN 101 Eng. Comp. - 3 hrs.
 SP 101 Fund. of Speech - 3 hrs.

C. DISTRIBUTION REQUIREMENTS- One course or one sequence in each category of disciplines acceptable to meet general education goals. 26-35 hrs.

1. Two courses, not necessarily in sequence, from: Natural Science, Biology, Chemistry, Physics. 8 hrs.
2. Two courses, not necessarily in sequence, from: Psychology, Sociology. 6 hrs.
3. One from: Computer Science, Logic, Math. 3 hrs.
4. Two courses, not necessarily in sequence from: Philosophy, Theology. 6 hrs.
5. One from: Economics, Political Science. 3 hrs.
6. Foreign Language 0-6 hrs.
 B.A.-Two courses at intermediate level, or equivalent.
 B.S.-Two courses at elementary level, or equivalent.
7. One from: Non-West, which may be in one of the areas listed above. 0-3 hrs.

D. CERTIFICATION REQUIREMENTS, MINORS, OR FREE ELECTIVES 29-48 hrs.

TOTAL FOR BACCALAUREATE DEGREE: 128

NOTE: Humanities, Global Studies and elementary foreign language courses would be lowered from 4 to 3 hours per semester.
 B.A. students without high school language, or who wish to begin a new language would need 12 hours to complete intermediate level.

CLOSING RECOMMENDATIONS

- A. That a revised outline of general education requirements be presented to faculty for review and endorsement, and to the appropriate committees for approval.
- B. That the revision be implemented beginning in Fall, 1984.
- C. That a continuing committee on General Education be appointed by the Academic Dean as a Subcommittee of Academic Affairs.
- D. That a new one-hour course in Liberal Arts be developed, tested and evaluated by the committee on General Education for eventual inclusion in the General Education Program.

As many of you are aware, the Task Force on General Education has formulated a set of eight goals of general education at Marian College and has proposed a revision of our general education requirements based on these goals. The Task Force presented this revision in five meetings last semester, four for faculty, staff, administration, and students serving on College Council and the Academic Affairs Committee and one open to all students. A copy of the eight goals, the proposed revision, and a set of four closing recommendations (which all appear above) were also posted on the main bulletin board in Marian Hall for the final month of last semester.

Because the Task Force would like to gain more student feedback concerning the proposal, it has scheduled two meetings open to all students. Both meetings will be held in Room 157 of Marian Hall. The first will be at 3:30 on Wednesday, Feb. 1, and the second will be at 12:30 on Thursday, Feb. 2nd. As a member of the Task Force for the past three years, I urge you to read the following goals, proposal, and recommendations carefully and then attend one of the meetings in order to ask questions, voice concerns, or show support.

Your feedback will be appreciated and given careful consideration.

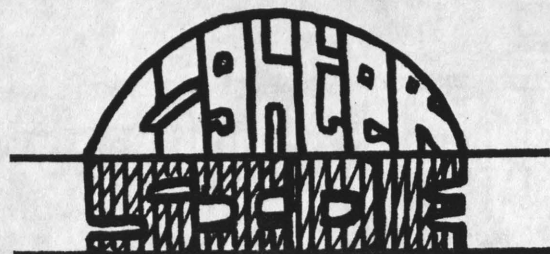
