Marian Athlete Turns Pro

Tom Linkmeyer, a Versailles native, has played baseball for 21 years. He played Pee Wee, Little League, Babe Ruth, and American Legion ball during the summer months.

Linkmeyer came to Marian on an athletic scholarship. He had heard of the college through his high school baseball coach, Ted Ahaus, a former Marian baseball player.

While at Marian, Linkmeyer was all-conference two years and all-district his junior year. He led the team in batting averages with a .530 his junior year. He had the most home runs his sophomore year.

Linkmeyer was drafted the sixth round, "I was overwhelmed with joy when I heard I was drafted. It really didn't matter who I was drafted by."

"To play professional baseball with the Toronto Blue Jays Association" was Linkmeyer's reason for quitting school.

His first taste of being a professional athlete was in the Pioneer League (rookie ball), in Medicine Hat, Alberta, in Canada.

The difference between college and professional competition is "the caliber of play, and the pitching is much faster," said Linkmeyer. "The players are much better because they are from all over the United States."

Linkmeyer's first season was a rough one. He broke his third finger his second time at bat during his first game. He was out four weeks. Then, he was "beaned" in the head by a fast ball and was out three games.

Playing in 45 games last summer, Linkmeyer said the only thing he did not like was the long, tiring bus rides.

Linkmeyer may go to Mexico to play winter ball, but first must receive permission from the Toronto Organization. This is being arranged by his agent, Milt Thompson.

Spring training is held in Dunedin, Florida, in March.

"I'm really excited about the upcoming season and a little bit nervous about my first spring training."

After spring training, Linkmeyer will be moved to either an A, AA, or AAA league. He thinks he will probably go to Kinston, N.C., or Knoxville, Tenn.

When asked about how he felt about leaving college after three years, Tom replied, "I really enjoy playing pro ball, it's like a dream come true. I don't regret quitting school, but I do miss the people."

He plans to finish his B.S. degree in Physical Education with an English minor when time permits.



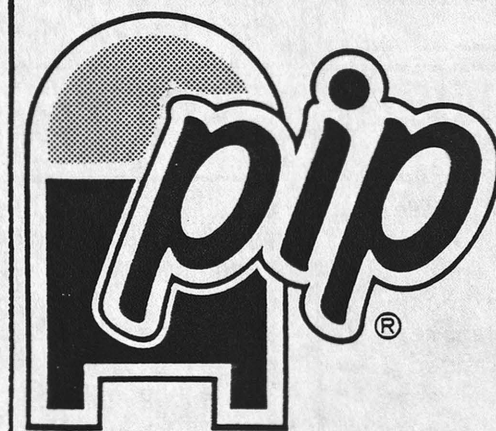
