## KNIGHTS STUMBLE ON HARDWOOD

After roaring off to a tremendous start, in which they mowed down four straight oppose nents, the Knights have begun to stumble on the hardwood and currently own a three-game losing string in dropping to an even $5-5$ record.

The third consecutive loss came last Wednesctay as the MARIANites fell victim to a so-so Villa Madonna squad in Covington, Kentucky. The final score read $81-65$ in favor of the hosts who led only by a scant two noints with less than three minutes to play. But once again inconsistent floor play spelled defeat for the Knights when it really counted. Larry Drodnick faced MARIAN's scoring with 16 points while freshman Randy Stahley continued his fine relief efforts by contributing 13 points.

Transylvania overcame the balanced scoring atteck which has become a MARTAN trademark as the Knights droned an $89-75$ to the Pioneers in Lexington, Kentucky. Randy Stanley continused his sparkling play in banging in 17 points in the losing effort. Joe Bittlemeyer came out, of his slum n to hit 16 noints while Larry Brodnick and Larry Schmalz contributed IL and 23 points. respectively.

The beat goes on Saturday night as MARIAN treks to Fort Wayne to battle St. Francis and then participates in the Indianapolis Classic at Indiana Central next weekend. Then, after al layoff for Christmas, th Knights head east to take on nationally ranked Ashland College on January 3, and then it's on to Erie, Pa. for a January 4 engagement with Gannon's Golden fights.

3) Freshman Crientation was the first onCammus erent of the Social Committee. It i.s a well-known fact that the Orientetion Program is still lacking the necessary academic atmosnhere, but the goal of meeting future classmetes and friends seems to have been accomnlished. If any one has suggestions for imnroving the Orientation Program for next vear's frosh, Father Konstenzer in the Student Personnel Office should be notified.
4) The Hanoenings Concert, the big Social Committee event of the first semester was, although a loss was incurred, a tremendous social. success. Those students who attended seemed to 0 be very satisfied with the boys' nerformance and vice versa. Just this week, the students of MARIAN were comnlimented by il De Marino, manarer of Robert Morris Bocking Agency in New York City.
