KNIGHTS STUMBLE ON HARDWOOD

After roaring off to a tremendous start, in which they mowed down four straight opponents, the Knights have begun to stumble on the hardwood and currently own a three-game losing string in dropping to an even 5-5 record.

The third consecutive loss came last Wednesday as the MARIANites fell victim to a so-so Villa Madonna squad in Covington, Kentucky. The final score read 81-65 in favor of the hosts who led only by a scant two points with less than three minutes to play. But once again inconsistent floor play spelled defeat for the Knights when it really counted. Larry Prodnick paced MARIAN's scoring with 16 points while freshman Randy Stahley continued his fine relief efforts by contributing 13 points.

Transylvania overcame the balanced scoring attack which has become a MARIAN trademark as the Knights dropped an 89-75 to the Pioneers in Lexington, Kentucky. Randy Stahley continued his sparkling play in banging in 17 points in the losing effort. Joe Bittlemeier came out of his slump to hit 16 points while Larry Brodnick and Larry Schmalz contributed 14 and 13 points, respectively.

The beat goes on Saturday night as MARIAN treks to Fort Wayne to battle St. Francis and then participates in the Indianapolis Classic at Indiana Central next weekend. Then, after a layoff for Christmas, the Knights head east to take on nationally ranked Ashland College on January 3, and then it's on to Erie, Pa. for a January 4 engagement with Gannon's Golden Knights.

INTRAMURAL FOOTBALL

The playoff game between Terrible Tom's and The Big Ten, rescheduled because of last week's inclement weather, has been set for Sunday at 2:00 and the report from the MC Intramural Commission is that the game will be played in spite of the weather.

INTRAMURAL B-BALL

1) To keep everyone busy during the summer there was a calendar to organize and have printed. This was accomplished with relative ease, and hopefully, each student now has one.

2) Also during the summer months MARIAN College became a member of the Alliance for Campus Talent (ACT). ACT is a service of the National Student Association and serves several purposes: ACT eliminates payment of a booking agent in such events as the recent Fall Concert. There is a set fee for bookings made through ACT (in the case of the Happenings \$90. was the fee). This stipend was a mere pittance when one considers that The Happenings, if booked through an agency normally cost \$2,750, compared to the \$2,000. paid by going through ACT. There are many other services connected with ACT, but they are too numerous to mention now. Let it suffice to say that the \$25.00 of the student's money (initiation fee for ACT) is being put to good use.

3) Freshman Orientation was the first on-Campus event of the Social Committee. It is a well-known fact that the Orientation Program is still lacking the necessary academic atmosphere, but the goal of meeting future classmates and friends seems to have been accomplished. If any one has suggestions for improving the Orientation Program for next year's frosh, Father Konstanzer in the Student Personnel Office should be notified.

4) The Happenings Concert, the big Social Committee event of the first semester was, although a loss was incurred, a tremendous social success. Those students who attended seemed to be very satisfied with the boys' performance and vice versa. Just this week, the students of MARIAN were complimented by Al De Marino, manager of Robert Morris Booking Agency in New York City. While speaking with Julius Iokin of ACT in Washington, D.C., the statement was made by Julius that, "De Marino told me to let you know that The Happenings really enjoyed playing at MARIAN. Future: 7) At a meeting with representatives from Butler, IU Extension, and Purdue Extension, held on Monday, December 11, several topics were considered:
