FORUM

Tuesday, February 7, was the date of a college Forum discussing the proposed revision of general education requirements by the Task Force on General Education. The Forum was open to all faculty and students to ask questions or express concern over the proposal. Although the majority of faculty members were present, few students attended.

Sr. Marilyn Hofer, a member of the Task Force, began the discussion by presenting a copy of the proposed requirement revisions. Two alterations have been made to the proposal. Under Course Requirements (Section 8), Humanities has been retained as an 8 hr. course, and under Distribution Requirements (Section C), one course from both Philosophy and Theology, 6 hrs., has been retained from the present General Education Requirements.

NATIONAL NEWS

U.S. new car sales rose 33% in early Feb. to 181,694 units. Sales were equivalent to an annual rate of 7.8 million units, far stronger than a year earlier, but down from late January's rate of nine million units.

The dollar plunged despite two U.S. economic reports that foreign-exchange traders said should have reinforced its strength. Gold rose \$6.30 an ounce to \$383.50 on the Comex.
