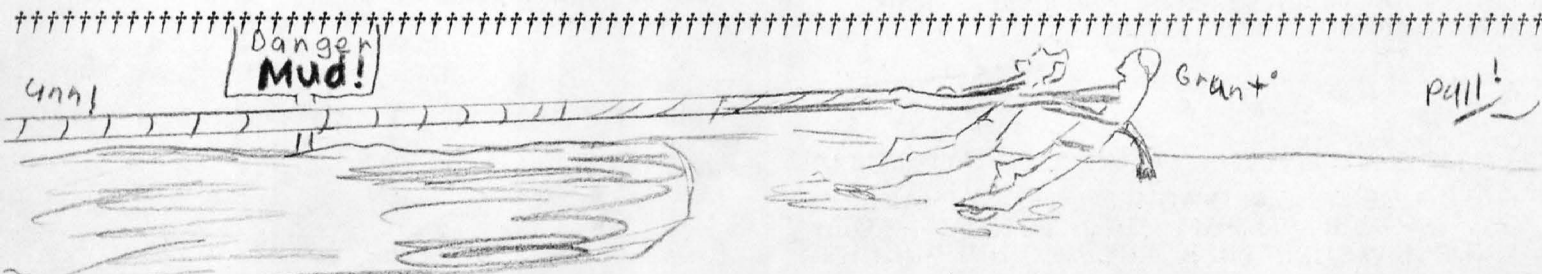

Vance Packard, journalist and author, and one of the most perceptive social critics of our time, will speak at Butler Wednesday, May 3, at 7:30 p.m., under the sponsorship of Holcomb Research Institute, Butler University and the Indiana Committee for the Humanities. Mr. Packard will discuss contemporary science's ambitions and projects for reshaping people and controlling their behavior. He questions what happens to the individual in the face of these rapid social and technological changes. These concerns are the subject of his eighth book, "The People Shapers."

Mr. Packard's lecture is a special event in Holcomb's regular monthly film/discussion series, "Human Values in a Changing World."
