Boycott McDonalds

Jack Anderson has reported that the Chairman of the Board of McDonalds Restaurants contributed \$255,000 to President Nixon's Re-Election Campaign Fund in order to keep the regular minimum wage for youth at \$1.60 when the regular minimum wage is raised to \$2.00. A bill for this sub-minimum wage has been introduced to Congress and McDonalds is lobbying actively for its passage. The bill will allow employers to hire students under the age of 21 and non-students under the age of 18 for 80% of the regular minimum wage.

This bill not only discriminates against young people, but specifically against students. The benefits of this discrimination will go to McDonalds in the form of cheap labor and greater profits due to their employment of a large number of students. On the other hand, it will discourage many young people from continuing their education and will specifically hamper those who find it necessary to work their way through college.

The National Student Lobby, to which the Marian College Student Association belongs, has called for a boycott against McDonalds to protest their efforts to secure this sub-minimum wage for youth. All students have a direct interest in supporting this boycott so that the Lobby can be effective in counter-acting McDonalds discriminatory activities.

Students:

In September of 1971 a committee of students was formed with the purpose of attaining some sort of visitation policy suitable to Marian College. Not until May of 1972 was such a policy actually realized. Eight months of very diligent and time-consuming work went into formulizing and gaining approval of the present Guest Hours policy. Now, because of a small minority of students the policy is jeopardized.

The rationale of the Guest Hours policy was founded on the concept that students are responsible and mature individuals. No matter what a rationale says, actions are stronger than words. The recent gross abuse of the Guest Hours policy reflects an immature student incapable of proper judgment. This leaves the proponent of the student's position practically defenseless.

If we hope to gain further progressive changes in existing policies we must start respecting those changes already achieved. If we do not the Guest Hours policy will be terminated as well as forfeiting chances of gaining other policies (i.e. alcohol and self-regulated freshmen hours). Is it just that a small minority of students will be the cause for every student losing this recently recognized right?

Senator Birch Bayh, Democrat-Indiana, informally addressed students and faculty Monday afternoon. Though pressed for time the Senator did make a few opening remarks, "ramblings" as he called them, and entertained questions. In the course of the all too brief discussion, Bayh touched on a number of subjects including his work in the Senate, the Equal Rights Amendment, and the Hartke "frisk" to name a few.

Noting that a number of reputable polls have indicated young people have doubts about the political process, Bayh emphasized that men in government are eager to hear from young people and he encouraged the young to become more active.

Turning to the subject of the Equal Rights Amendment, the Senator urged active support for it. On the subject of legislation Bayh pointed out two amendments he has worked on--that for direct election of the President, which failed by a narrow margin, and that for eighteen year old voting rights, which is now law.

When questioned about Capital Hill talk of mandatory retirement at age seventy, Bayh recalled fatherly advice he once received, "just because there's snow on the roof, doesn't mean the furnace is out." He added that he had known young men who were mentally aged and aged men mentally young.

The subject of aid to North Vietnam was raised and he answered that at present it is inappropriate to think of foreign aid when our domestic resources were limited and needs so great.

Bayh criticized Nixon's strong stand against amnesty as well as the President's characterization of alternate service in Vista, Peace Corps, etc. as a junket. Though supporting alternate service for conscientious objectors, he did see a problem in determining the difference between real objectors and those who fled the country for other reasons.

Another issue touched upon was welfare. Senator Bayh favors welfare for those in real need, and those not qualifying should be removed from the payrolls. Also welfare benefits should be standardized across the country.

In the few minutes that remained the Senator addressed himself to Senator Hartke's recent refusal to be searched before boarding airplanes. Senator Bayh saw the necessity for search measure. In this, he did not share his colleagues views, yet respected Hartke's conviction to follow his own beliefs.

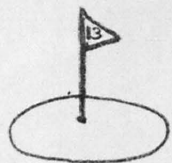
