

EDITORIAL

Today, March 1, all highways have posted 55 mph limits in a nationwide, mandatory effort to conserve fuel and avoid gas rationing in the future. Although this is a minor inconvenience, it will save gas, money and lives. Recently, Congress passed a bill calling for a roll-back in gasoline prices of up to 4d a gallon. Nixon will veto this bill. His reasoning is basically the following:

First of all, a cut-back in prices would cause the oil companies to slow down production as their profits are reduced (which would lead one to believe that oil companies can induce an oil shortage at will). Secondly, slowed productions would obviously lead to greater gas shortage and longer waiting lines at service stations. Ultimately, this would lead to rationing a measure the President is totally opposed to. Nixon believes that the only way to avoid long waits at stations and gas rationing is to increase supplies of fuel. An obviously brilliant insight on the part of the president.

It would seem as though Nixon's idea of increasing supply is to price it off the market. Once again, the price of gasoline is increasing another 2¢. At the same time, oil companies are still making exhorbant profits. Service station allocations are decreasing monthly. February, the shortest month of the year, saw a doubling of sevice stations running out of gas since the

month before.

Much of the blame has been placed on the Arab Boycott. However, it has been pointed out that American oil imports have been the same during the Boycott as before, even though vigorously denied. Neither can the shyrocketing prices of gasoline be blamed on the Arabs. Federal and State taxes still make up the bulk of the price of a gallon of gas.

In short, we have supposedly past the peak of the "crisis", yet prices are soaring and supplies seem to be dwindling. Long lines at service stations in many parts of the country are not

Results of the December Health Service Evaluation would indicate that health services are not all they could be.

Of the 192 students who responded, 103 had made use of the services, 42 felt that these services were adequate; 71 (ten of these having not used the service) felt that they were inadequate. The three main inadequacies cited were limited service hours, limited medication and the inability to obtain prescriptions.

The Health Center was originally designed to care for minor ailments, to dispense ordinary medicine (non-prescription drugs), and to refer students for further care. Students are free to choose any physician or hospital they wish.

The Student Services is presently investigating the feasibility of expanding the health services offered. One result of this investigation has been a list of doctors, both general practitioners and specialists, who will accept Marian students as patients. These names can be obtained directly from Student Services or from the residence directors or the resident assistants as well as the nurse.

Presently Mrs. Sharon Osborne, R. N., Ext. 552, is on duty five days per week from 9:30 a.m. until 12:30 p.m. in the medical suite in Clare Hall. This is located on the ground floor at the west end of the building. Any problems occurring outside these hours may be referred to the residence director or the resident assistants.

In the last few weeks there has been some discussion of the lack of attendance at recent events sponsored by the U.B.I., namely those which occurred during Black Culture Week. Being a senior I have often wondered why the students have let Student Board spend their money on such generally non-rewarding events. Over the last four years Black Culture Week and other Student Board funded U.B.I. activities have acquired ill-reputable attendances. From a popular belief and general concern, I feel that their budget should be eliminated from Student Board funding. I'm also tired of Student Board for their failure to take a stand on the problem, while they write it off with tokenism. How many students does the Board represent anyway?

Representatives of UBI attended a meeting after submitting a new budget. After a considerable amount of discussion a new budget was finally agreed upon.
