Fair is fair. Right. At least that seems to be the consensus of the American electorate. In 1972, the United States voters handed Richard Nixon an overwhelming mandate to be President. He accepted it, then misinterpreted it, and eventually resigned. Now we have a new Republican President. Mr. Ford has many problems. The most important being the economic crisis which exists in America today.

Now the electorate has done a complete turnabout. Apparently the Democrats have received their mandate from the people. This will be the eleventh straight Democratic Congress. Only now the Democrats have strengthened their already existing control in Congress. They captured 43 extra House seats for a total of at least 291. With three seats still undecided, they have won a clear two-thirds majority. This is just short of the 295 seats the Democrats won in Lyndon B. Johnson's landslide victory ten years ago. Also they picked up at least three Senate seats for a total of 61.

Assuredly there will be conflicts between our Republican President and the Democratic Congress. Obviously what will be needed is some type of compromise. After Tuesday's election, Mr. Ford said, "We will meet Congress more than half way." Senate Democratic Leader Mike Mansfield said that, "He hopes now that the election is over, we will be able to get together and work co-operatively." I hope so too. But will they? It is difficult to say who will be the first to compromise. The Democrats know they have the upper **hand** with their strength in Congress. I don't think Tuesday's election was a referendum on President Ford's economic policies. But some Democratic leaders probably will. If President Ford makes the first move toward compromise, it could be considered as a concession to the Democratic strength. But if neither budes in their

The lack of communication and cooperation between organizations and groups here at Marian continues to dazzle me. An excellent example occurred again Wednesday night with the scheduling of two conflicting events: the film Walking Tall and the concert given by Doyle White in the Music Building.

As I have said before, I do not feel we can afford to fund conflicting events in a school of this size, especially when there are so many other open dates in which no activities are scheduled. In the case of Wednesday night, the film schedule was posted and budgeted for at the beginning of the year. The Music Dept. and Music Club, regardless of any other considerations, scheduled the Doyle White concert. The date for the concert was not approved by the Social Committee nor was it budgeted for by the Music Club (cost \$50.) By the time I was aware of these facts, it was simply too late to do anything about the conflict.

The misuse of any Student Association funds is only my responsibility so I must certainly take the direct blame for the funding of the conflicting events by the Student Association. I can only apologize for this error and promise that in the future I will approve purchase requisitions only for those events properly budgeted for and approved by the Social Committee.

If only everyone would realize how much better off we would be, by working together through the Social Committee rather than as autonomous groups, in making Marian a more active and enjoyable place to be.

A camera has been stolen from the Dark Room. The staff can make do this semester with their present equipment but will need a new camera next semester.

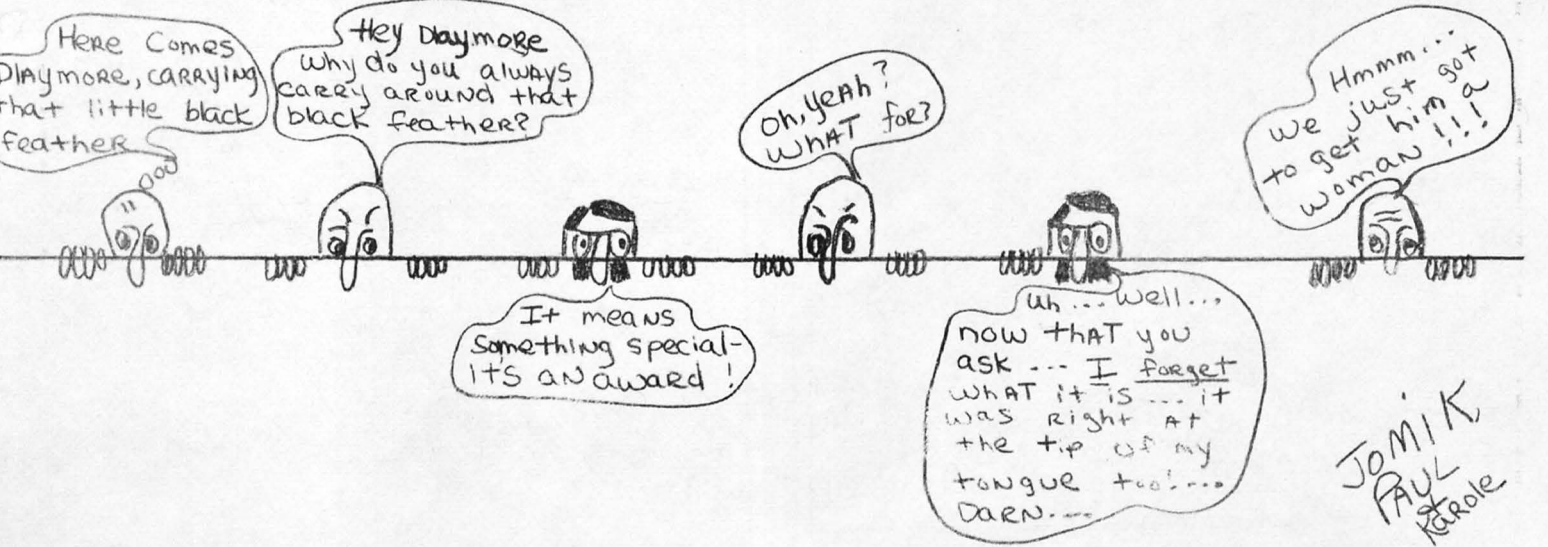
New Business
