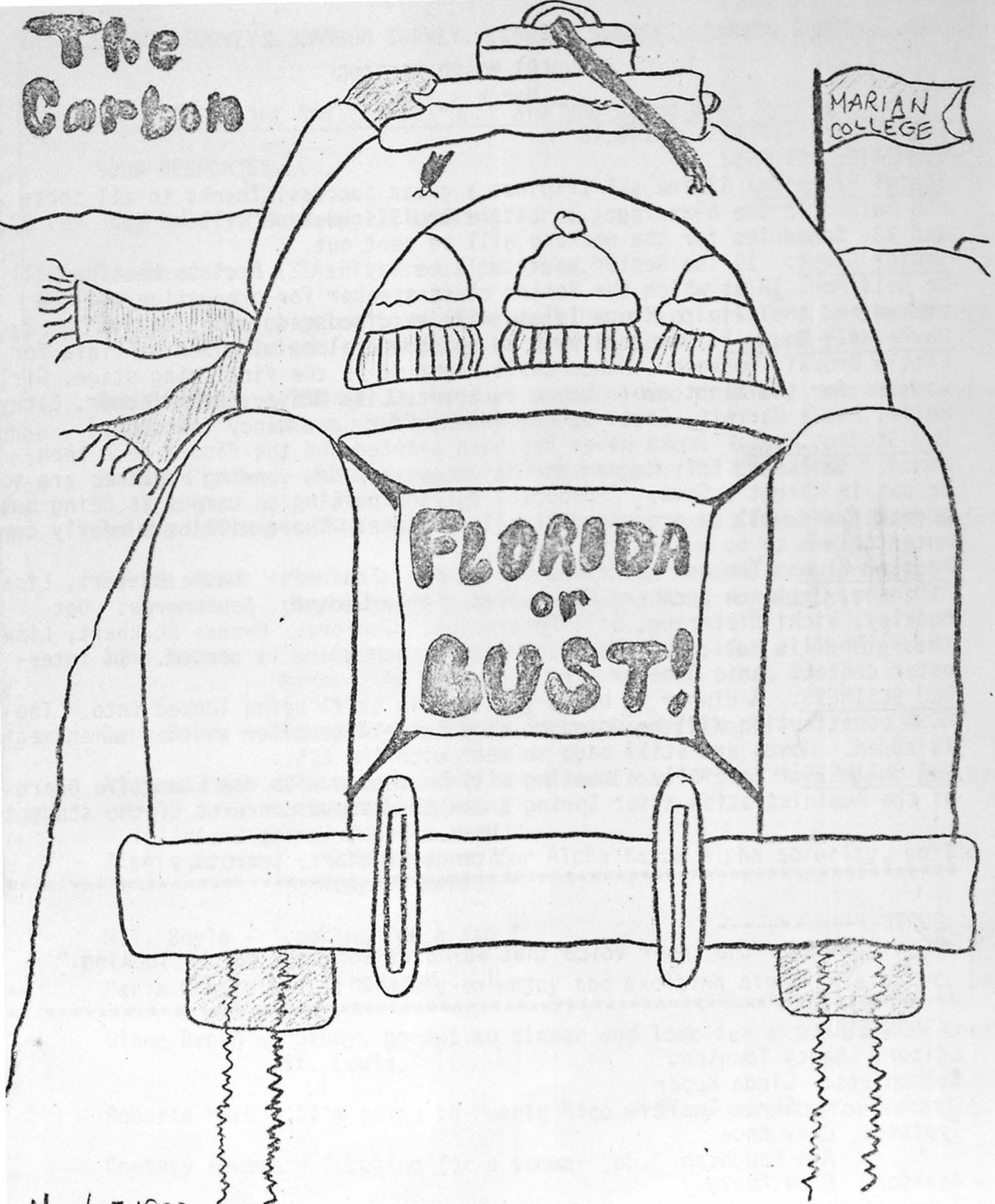

CRITICAL ANALYSIS: "Of Mice and Men"

A dream. A hope. A simple wish for tomorrow killed with a bullet. That's the theme of John Stienbeck's drama, "Of Mice and Men," directed Mr. Daniel Kasle and presented by the Marian College Theatre Department February 26, 27, and 28.

Stienbeck is a master of literature, and the complexity of his character challenges even the most experienced actors. Dennis McCullough played the influential but visionary George Milton with a down-to-earth touch, although he seemed a little too optimistic. "The moron," Lennie, played with childlike hope by Tim Slongo, touched the whole audience with the teardrops of his plight. Rusty Clyma was dark, frustrated, and jealous as Curley, although he did not appear quite as motivated as he did in his suave portrait of Tartuffe. Flirtatious and defiant, Page Phillips "flaunted" Curley's wife with a delicate sort of toughness, but she seemed to lack some dimension. Robert Lane slowly elicited sympathy from the audience as overworked Candy, while Glenn White handled Crooks's loneliness with gusto. Joe Fischer was threatening as the Boss, but he needed to mature somewhat. Effective and quick thinking, Sean Johnson played Slim without trying to draw attention to himself, but he could have been a bit stronger. They and the rest of the cast were fresh, full of talent, and dedicated wholeheartedly to the production.

Chris Reeves, Sean Johnson, and Yoshisuko Sato created a textured and rustic set that managed to artistically squeeze four different scenes on one stage. The sound and lights technicians made innovative use of the available facilities. Especially effective was the slow blackout in the final scene culminating with the spark of death popping into the blackness. The costuming was basic and completely satisfactory. The darkness of Rusty Clyma's (Curley) clothes added an extra layer of "villainousness" to him. His make-up was passable, although Joe Fischer (the Boss) looked more like Curley's little brother than his father. The program cover was declarative and a bit omniscient, thanks to the hard work of the Marian College Art Club. The program itself, however, did not give credit to everyone to whom credit was due, such as the Art Club. Yet, all in all, the technical crew did a fine job doing all the "behind the scenes" work. Both they and the cast deserve a little place, where they can live off the fat of the land for "bucking Barley" in the Marian Auditorium this past weekend.
