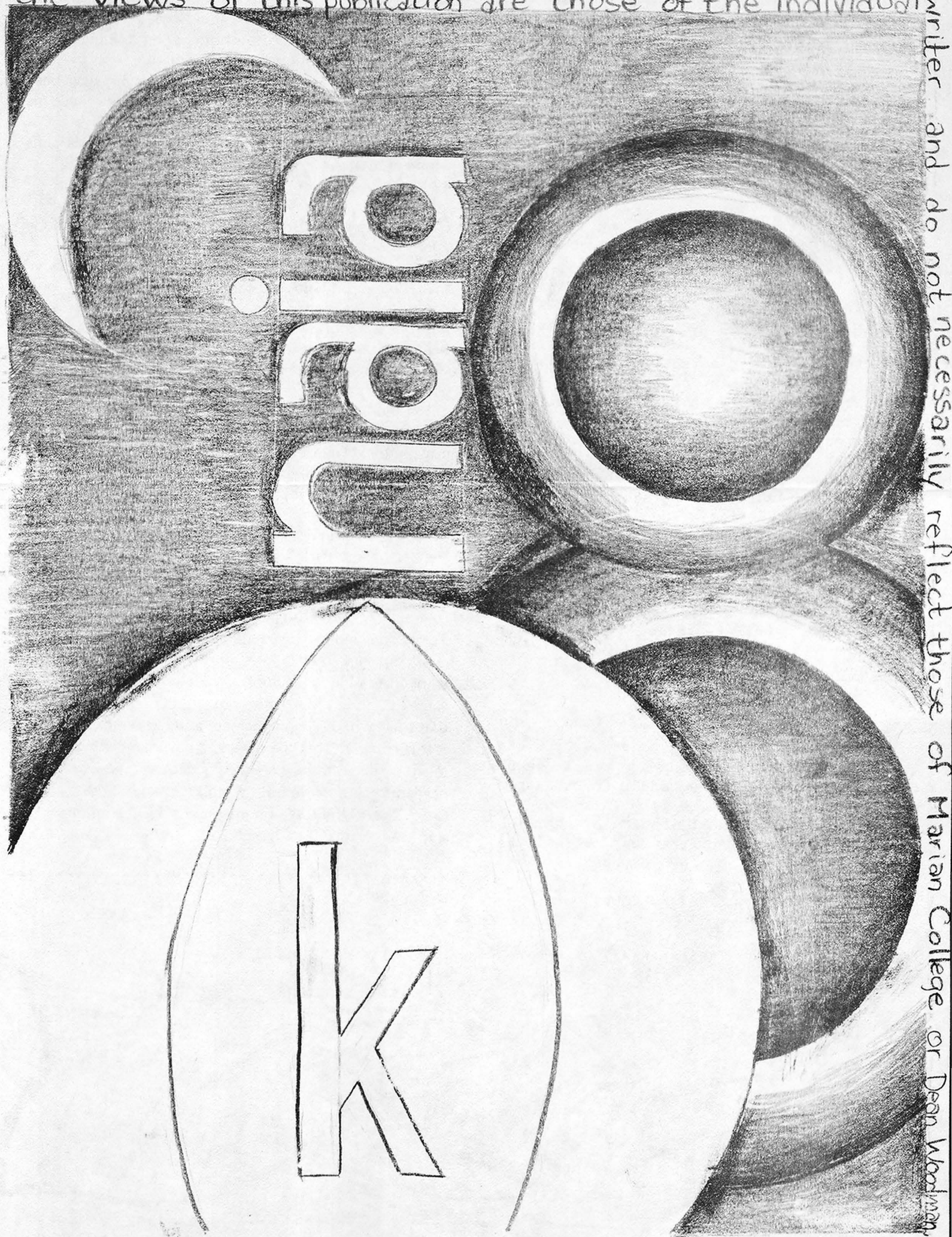

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FILM SERIES--"FREE TO BE ME"

A series of 17 minute films followed by informal discussion and refreshments will be offered in the Clare Hall Lounge on Tues.evenings at 9p.m. beginning on Tues., Jan. 29 through Apr. 1. The series, by John Powell, probes what it means to become a person who is trully alive. He explores the meaning of freedom and its relationship to the way we think and feel about ourselves, others, the world and God. The first film is on "How Do I See Reality?". Each film is a seprate program so that a person can see one, some or all of them. The series provides an opportunity for personal development in an informal setting. John Powell has written several popular books: Fully Human, Fully Alive, Why Am I Afraid To Tell You Who I Am? and The Secret Of Staying In Love. The series is sponsored by Campus Ministry and is open to all Marian College students and friends. The series will be repeated each Wed. starting Jan. 30, for Adult Learners, Faculty, Staff, and Administrators; Home Ec. lab, Clare Hall.

With a present record of 12 wins and 5 losses, the Marian Basketball Team is now a competitor for the National Athletic Independent Association Championship Finals to be held in Kansas City. Coach John Grimes has lead the team to its current position and a ranking of 8th in the nation in defense. With 8 district games remaining, Marian is 2nd behind Franklin. Team members are confident that their Kansas City goal can be actualized. Of the tournaments in which they have already competed, the Knights were victors in the Taylor Tournament and runners-up in the Rose-Hulman Tourney.

Their formula for success is not entirely unique, but rather is the foundation for any competitive sport — experience and teamwork. Most of the players have been regulars on the court since their freshman year. Since his arrival 3 years ago, Grimes has refined recruits into seasoned veterans. Prior to their present record, Marian's winningest season in the recent past was 13 wins and 12 losses.

Individual talents are utilized within a team framework. Of the starters, Jim Brothers is strong on rebounds and 2nd on the team in assists. Chad Miller, the teams leading scorer averaging 15-16 points a game, also leads the rebounds and blocked shots. Dale Wernke not only fares well in stealing the ball, but also possesses an impressive 32 for 34 free throw record. Freshman Brian Feldman has been leading scorer for the past 5 games. George Chapman had his best game Wednesday night with 15 points.

Considerable support comes from the reinforcements. Phil Savari is the leading assist man averaging 5 per game with 11 in last Saturday's game against I.U. Southeast. Savari, along with Miller, was named to the Rose-Hulman Tourney Team. John Brinkley, Brendan McGeehan and Ron Brothers all come off the bench to shoot better than 50% from the floor. Coaches Mike Henderson and Rick Johnson assist Grimes, particularly in the area of defense. Other players include Brian Avery, Matt Boyle, Brian Burkert, Tom Eagan, Paul Hensel, John Howell, Gary Moorman, Richard Peek, Tom Zobel and Managers Mike Pratt and Tom Lewis.

A factor not to be ignored in the Knight's success is the increasing fan support. Wednesday night's game had an estimated turnout of 1000. It is hoped that this form of encouragement will continue.

It is apparent that the Knight's have the distinguished talent along with the essential concept of teamwork needed to triumph in both the district and Kansas City. The 1979-80 season may just see a championship team who's time has come.

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Here we are again, the beginning of a new year, a new semester and a new decade! It is indeed surprising that the new year was not welcomed with the traditional carpet of snow. Mother Nature must have decided on a new way of welcoming in the new decade. I hope that she doesn't sprinkle the shooting sprouts and ploughed fields with the white dust later on in the year.
