## V. P. - NEW COMMITTEE MEMBERS

To the Student Body,

"The Marian College Student Association is the campus student government organization which plans and organizes most of the extracurricular activity of the student community. Its jurisdiction extends to all students and student groups. It seeks to foster student responsibility and leadership, to provide a means of student cooperation and communication with the faculty and administration, and to demonstrate that students may effectively and responsibly govern themselves with only a minimum of administrative regulation.

The Student Association exercises its function as the voice of the student opinion through the Executive Board, which strives to better life in the College Community by solving problems and creating outlets for student interest. The Board's meetings are open" (page 38, Student Handbook)

"As constituents of the academic community, students should be free, individually and collectively, to express their views on issues of institutional policy and on matters of general interest to the student body. The student body should have clearly defined means to participate in the formulation and application of institutional policy affecting academic and student affairs. (MCSA Constitution)

The above quotations clearly define the students' rights of participation and involvement. As a member of the Executive Board, and working with only 12 other "involved" students, such rights are being wasted.

Presently, there are two committees working under the Board, the Extension of Guest Hours and the Alcoholic Beverage Policy. Each committee is headed by a Senior and consists of fellow Senior members. Maybe one forgets, but unless the underclassmen are involved, effective approval and enactment of such policies can not be carried through. We will be leaving in a few months (not meant as a sad note) and who will then work for the changes this campus needs? Many students complain about policies (including Seniors) on this campus, but complaining is not enough. Unless you can further our cause for improvement through articles in the Carbon or membership and assistance on committees, you should not complain.

Admittedly, this campus needs "help" in many areas, but the students have to notice the need, participate on committees, and help see and fight for it through Student Services, College Council and on to the Board of Trustees. The Student Board and its committees need your support and some of you have 3½ more years here. Are you going to be satisfied with what you have now, or are you going to help change things?

Committees seem like a farce sometimes. There are disappointments like having to get pol-

For the benefit of the students at Marian, the Social Planning Committee rents a number of films a year. Money for the films is allocated by each class. Clare and Doyle Hall 16. When the films are relatively inexpensive we can afford to show them free of charge. But the higher priced, usually the better films must be shown for a minimal charge. The money collected from these films goes back into the film fund to pay for additional films to be enjoyed by all.

When we ordered our films last spring we operated on the theory that we could order more films than we had the actual money for. And if each student who attends the films would pay \$.50 we would have enough money to pay for all the films. In this manner we could provide a variety of films for the enjoyment of the entire student body. \$.50 is not too much to ask for the privilege of seeing a movie you'd pay \$2.50 for elsewhere. Unfortunately, a few students feel that it is their privilege to see the movies free. This isn't fair to the rest of the students who pay their share in order to have entertainment on campus. If a minority of students see the movie at no charge, why can't everyone else? Fine, we can show all movies for free and we can have films instead of 16. The films for your entertainment, for "something to do." There's absolutely nothing we can do to take your money from you once you've managed to get into the auditorium. We can only rely on your honesty and your willingness to adhere to certain policies in order for the entire student body to benefit from the films.

# IT'S YOUR CHOICE

## ADMINISTRATIVE ACTION PROCEDURE

### RATIONALE:

Certain forms of behavior which disturb or offend others, which violate rights of others living and working on campus, run counter to a major goal of the College. For this reason, and to protect the rights of the community, the Hall Directors and their staffs have the responsibility and the authority to correct, to counsel and to administer sanctions when necessary.

### OFFICIALS:

The Residence Hall Directors and the Dean of Student Services shall be authorized to administer certain specified sanctions for violations of College or Residence Hall policies to students within their jurisdictions.

### AUTHORIZED SANCTIONS:

1. Monetary fines not to exceed \$25 for each offense.
2. Residence Hall Work penalties not to exceed 10 hours per week for a maximum period of two weeks for each offense.
3. Letter of notification to parents or guardians specifying that a violation occurred and the behavior which led to the violation (consistent with the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act, 1974).
4. Any combination of the above.

### PROSCRIBED CONDUCT SUBJECT TO ADMINISTRATIVE ACTION:

Any violation of published rules of Residence Hall living units or any act of misconduct specified in the Code of Student Rights and Responsibilities shall be subject to administrative disciplinary action.

### GENERAL PROCEDURES:

1. The Residence Hall Director in consultation with the Dean of Student Services, shall have full power to determine which sanctions shall be applied and the severity of the sanction.
2. After notification by the Residence Hall Director, payment of monetary fines shall be made at the Business Office by the appropriate due date. Income from fines levied shall be deposited in the Residence Hall maintenance and improvement fund.
3. Work Penalties will be assigned by the respective Hall Directors. These may involve performing various maintenance tasks in or around the hall such as mopping and waxing floors, washing windows, vacuuming carpets, picking up trash, etc. Upon completion of the assigned task(s), the Hall Director will determine whether or not it was satisfactorily done. If not, the Hall Director shall be authorized to assign additional work hours, not to exceed the maximum number designated above, until the job is satisfactorily completed.
4. If the student is not in agreement with the sanction imposed, he may request a hearing before the College Judicial Panel. Requests for a hearing shall be submitted to the Dean of Student Services within three (3) days of the date the sanction was imposed and shall specify, in detail the reasons why a hearing is requested. The Dean will

then arrange for a meeting of the Panel to hear the case.

5. The Residence Hall Directors, in consultation with the Dean of Student Services, shall have sole discretion concerning whether or not administrative powers will be exercised. The Directors and Dean shall retain the right to refer violations directly to the College Judicial Panel.
6. It is understood that these administrative powers shall be used in a professional manner with care and discretion. Sanctions should never be administered arbitrarily or capriciously. They are designed for use with individuals who fail to respond to other methods (i.e. counseling, admonition) of behavior change or control.

### FAILURE TO COMPLY:

This procedure is basically an agreement or "contract" between the Hall staff and the student. If the student fails to comply with the terms of the agreement he shall be subject to one or more of the following consequences:

1. Cancellation of Residence Hall Contract and removal from the Residence Hall.
2. Withholding of official College transcripts and/or registration for subsequent semester.
3. Letter to parents or guardians of student non-compliance, consistent with the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act, 1974.

## BERNIE WHO?

Dear Masses,

As a custodial employee of the maintenance staff, my job entails dusting and sweeping Marian hall daily. While making my usual working rounds, I inevitably "rub elbows" with many administrators, faculty, and students, and thus acquire much current information of the various new trends and the controversial ideas that circulate within this community. Last week, I learned of a proposal concerning "preferred parking" which is being initiated within the Student Services committee of the College Council. I wish to address myself to this issue, as I have speculated

extensively over it, and I feel competent to proffer my views concerning it. First, I will present the up-to-date facts as I understand them.

The discussion taking place in the Student Services committee deals with preferred parking for Seniors, at the north lots of the residence halls. So far, the means for assigning the spaces themselves has not been unanimously decided by the committee, although most of the members are affirmative towards a lottery assignment system. The method of imposing sanction for violations of the assignments will be distribution of parking tickets to the violators, with the enforcement of the policy resting on the resident hall assistants working under their usual delegated bureaucratic authority.

Preferred parking is not necessarily a new idea, for many schools have designated assigned parking areas for student use. This policy generally is designed such that students are given priority over non-college affiliates (e.g. visitors, etc.) as a service of the college, to ensure that a minimum of parking area can be utilized with maximum efficiency for those students' use. Some colleges even further this service by providing "preferred" parking position to their upperclass students, probably as a consolation-privilege intending to reward their students' achievement of the 'upperclassman' status. At surface value, this may seem to be a somewhat prejudiced rationale; yet, after closer examination, it becomes an unquestionably valid service of the institution for the benefit of those students who have remained with that institution for three or four years. However, because of its disputable nature, I further speculated upon the preceding statement; my purpose for speculation was to justify whether this particular situation would be meritable within the Marian College community. I arrived at the following conclusions.

Although I do not possess concrete statistical information, I suspect that each class that has entered Marian suffers a 15-20% attrition rate after four years; that is, for each given amount of students which enroll and accepted to Marian per annum, only 30-35% of that number will reach upperclassman status. Too, those students who have remained as members of

Marian College until they matriculate to graduation have become definite assets to this institution, for not only have they immensely contributed to the school financially as well as socially, but they have realized the inherent purpose of this institution, and as a consequence of this realization, they will have received their degree from Marian College. Therefore, why shouldn't the institution grant certain privileges to these upperclass students, either as an institutional service rewarding those students' loyalty, or as a community consolation commemorating their educational, emotional, and physical stamina?

The context of this proposal would not directly affect me in any way; however, I have become personally compassionate towards the Marian College senior. I can currently ascertain no definite reasons why this would be either contrary or threatening to any Marian tradition; au contraire, I feel that if preferred parking does become a senior privilege, it would become a subtle positive incentive for underclassmen as well as a magnificent Senior morale boost. Hence, I encourage the support of this proposal.
